## Amidst the Ocean

In order to make 40,000 people cross a bridge in an hour at $25 \mathrm{~km} / \mathrm{h}$, the bridge needs to be 138 m wide in case they do it by car, 38 m if by bus, 20 m if on foot and only 10 m wide if by bike. So this brief lapse of 10 minutes time could only be achieved otherwise by hyper-speed trains running at $100 \mathrm{~km} / \mathrm{h}$ every 30 seconds. But the bike still beats, since it is the only means of transport resolving door-to-door connection. [source> Ivan Illich via la ciudad viva]

The Bridge Project is Do Ho Suh's recently inaugurated show at Storefront for Art and Architecture New York. It consists of a two year speculative research results about how to build a fantastic bridge linking his two cities, NewYork and Seoul.
